DID YOU KNOW?

The Māori word for autism is 'Takiwātanga' ("tōku anō takiwā"), which translates to "my own time and space."

This word was created in 2017 by Keri Opai
Māori author, educator and social activist, who was tasked with creating a complete glossary of the language! Keri hopes the interpretation pays respect to the people, friends, caregivers, and whānau (extended family) with autism as "He mana tō te kupu" – "Words have great power."

Too Much! An Overwhelming Day By Jolene Gutierrez


This is a reassuring and helpful rhyme & picture book about sensory overload and what you can do when everything feels "too much".




